

# TN1010-1b: CSMAil Redistribution Issues for Visual Basic Developers

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## 1 OLE registration

Your application uses OLE automation to create an instance of the CSMAil client objects and for this to function correctly the CSMAil library must be registered with OLE. OLE registration is simply a process of writing some registry values to `HKEY_CLASSES_ROOT` so that OLE can find the library when your program is subsequently executed.

*It is important to understand the difference between OLE registration – which makes the library available to OLE and licensing which makes sure that the control is properly licensed on the target machine. OLE Registration is explained in this section and licensing is dealt with in Section 2.*

### 1.1 Automatic OLE registration in the Visual Basic Application Setup wizard

CSMAil ships with a `.dep` file which works with the Visual Basic Application Setup Wizard. You will find the `csmail.dep` file in the same directory as `csmail.dll`.

The `.dep` file contains information which will allow the Setup Wizard to automatically register the control after it has been installed on the target machine.

### 1.2 Automatic OLE registration in other install programs

If you are not using the Application Setup Wizard you can still take advantage of the self-registering mechanism included in CSMAil. The library is marked as OLE self-registering and most installation programs will perform the OLE registration for you. For example - in InstallShield you should create a File Group for `CSMAil.dll` (and any other self registering DLLs that your program uses) and set the `Self-Registered` property of the group to `Yes`. Other installation program will have similar mechanisms for achieving this – try searching for Self-Registering in the help file for your installation program.

### 1.3 Manual OLE registration using regsvr32.exe

If your installation program is not able to use the self-registration mechanism you can register the control manually using the redistributable `regsvr32.exe` tool provided with your development environment. After copying `csmail.dll` to your target machine you should invoke `regsvr32.exe`:

```
regsvr32 /s "C:\Program Files\My Program\CSMail.dll"
```

This will perform all the steps necessary to make the CSMail library available to OLE automation.

*You should find `regsvr32.exe` in the files installed by your development environment.*

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## 2 Licensing

You will have purchased a CSMail license from Codestone Ltd – the library checks the license whenever your program creates an instance of one of the client objects. Your development machine contains a copy of that license so that while you are developing your application you will be able to create instances of the client objects – but what when you need to distribute the control to a computer which does not have a copy of the license?

Visual Basic includes full support for licensed controls and in most cases you will have to take no extra steps to enable the license on the target machine.

**It is very important, however, that you include CSMail as a reference in your project and create objects using `New` rather than `CreateInstance()`.**

From the References Dialog (Project|References menu) you will find CSMail listed as 'Codestone Internet Mail Client Controls Type Library'.

You should use `Dim` and `New` to create instances of any of the client objects – for example:

```
Dim smtp As SMTPClient
...
Set smtp = New SMTPClient
```

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
